A Millionaires Tax can fund education, health care, and other basic needs.

Our state's tax system is one of the most inequitable in the U.S. Low and moderate-income working families pay far more in taxes than the wealthiest Washingtonians.

A Millionaires Tax Proposal would:

- Tax individual earnings over \$1 million annually at 9.9%
- Raise nearly \$3.5 billion per year
- Apply to only 20,000 of the wealthiest people in Washington

Instead of balancing our state budget through cuts that will take even more crucial resources away from WA families, **it's time to tax the wealthy** to fund core programs that most Washingtonians rely on.
